Your follow up, Sugar: The Life of a Kingpin's Wife, is highly anticipated. Will it live up to the hype?

MH-Without a doubt! My stories are absorbing and I take pride in my job. Everything I write will be excellent. The anticipation will never go away, that I promise. It's actually my own personal challenge and Sugar is certainly the next big gossip.

We've heard that some people are crediting you as the "Urban Martin Scorsese". That's a pretty big accolade. Will you be able to accept and take on the responsibility of such a title?

MH-Scorsese has written some of my favorite gangster movies. I'd like to think that I can represent the same way in our genre of literature. I'm not just an urban writer though; I have other works that spill into mainstream. In fact, I have a romance novel coming out next Valentine's Day called, "Oh, Michael."

Tell our readers what's been the most trying aspect of being a published author?

MH-Distribution and networking. We're supposed to be in business to make money, but distributors are too picky and too greedy; especially in this bad economy.

And other authors and publishers act intimidated or afraid to pool resources. Badland is about getting good books to readers, getting good writers opportunities, and of course good success in business. They're not afraid to cross the lines and work together to generate success. As an author I find distributors too strict, and if publishers don't network and cross promote we're all gonna lose out to the big house. Because the hard manuscripts are being substituted by the Big Boys electronically and the people who have worked hard on writing those books are losing out on profits. Just look at what happened to the music CD's. Consumers are opting to download digitally, at a cheaper cost, and our books could follow that trend.

Do you mind if we ask how many books you've sold to date?

MH-I'm old school. That sounds like you're trying to count my pockets. I'll say this though; Writer's Digest says the average novel in the US only sells about 500 copies. Mike Harper is looking at the average through the rearview mirror.
